
A Message from Bill

Nevertheless, effective literature was prepared, and in 1939 the publication of the Big Book became our very first world service. From that time on, it became perfectly clear what AA is, what it believes, and how it works. Millions of our pamphlets and hundreds of thousands of our books are today in circulation.

AA's message can never be garbled; anyone at all can find out about us with ease. What the dividends of this single project in world communication have been, only God himself knows.

GIVING OUT FREE LITERATURE

Next comes the question of whether A.A. as a whole should go in for what amounts to a money charity to individual newcomers and sponsors—via the selling of our books at cost or less. Up to now, we A.A.'s have strongly believed that money charity to the individual should not be a function of the A.A. as a whole. To illustrate: when a sponsor takes a new member in hand, he does not in the least expect that his group is going to pay the expenses he incurs while doing a Twelfth Step Job. The sponsor may give his prospect a suit of clothes, may get him a job or present him with an A.A. book. This sort of thing frequently happens and it is fine that it does. But such charities are the responsibility of the sponsor and not the A.A. group itself. If a sponsor cannot give or lend an A.A. book, one can be found in the library. It appears to be altogether clear that our world services need those book dollars far more than the buyers do.


